- 🦋 **Dipterists Bulletin** – a twice yearly newsletter with brief notes, observations and latest updates from the recording schemes
- 🦋 **The Dipterists Digest** – a popular twice yearly journal for all Dipterists with articles on identification, taxonomy, ecology, recording, conservation and behaviour of flies in Britain and NW Europe
- 🦋 **Annual Conference** – a 1-2 day event in November has a stimulating programme of presentations, discussions, exhibits and demonstrations, often with a social ‘Dipterists Supper’

- 🦋 **Field meetings** – a 7-9 day residential summer meeting organised in an area with interesting and varied habitats provides opportunities for studying and recording flies and learning identification skills. In addition shorter 2-3 day spring and autumn field meetings may be organised
- 🦋 **Workshops** – a weekend in March at a Field Study Centre where the focus is on identification skills. These can be for beginners but also at a higher level for Dipterists wanting to tackle more difficult groups of flies
- 🦋 **Recording Schemes** – the Dipterists Forum volunteers coordinate the gathering of records for 18 different fly families or groups. This important information is essential data for conservation and charting phenology. It is fed directly into the National Biodiversity Network. Some recording schemes have their own websites and newsletters
